## Stress: Finding the Sweet Spot

**We hear that stress can lead to everything from depression to cancer, but the right kind of stress can actually be beneficial.** And it's particularly important for young people, whose brains and bodies are uniquely sensitive to the impact of experience. Stress is really just our body's response to a challenge. The key to good stress is that the challenge be something you can manage and even master. That's why teachers who give students difficult but do-able work, producing a moderate amount of anxiety, are more effective than teachers who are permissive or tyrannical. Good teachers know how to push students without making them so anxious that they give up. They have found the sweet spot for stress: Too much or too little and people don't do their best. Moderate amounts of stress stimulate the production of adrenaline and cortisol, which enhance the growth of neurons and boost learning, memory, performance and resilience. But when pressure is too intense, or when people are stressed for long periods of time, the same hormones wreak havoc, shrinking neurons, harming performance, and creating health problems. # Chaplain's Reflection

## The Season of Lent

The 40 days of Lent represents the time Jesus spent in the desert and the 40 years the people of Israel waited to enter into the Promised Land. It also symbolises the journey of our life, since we are going towards the promise of eternal life in Heaven where we will be with God forever. In this journey there will be difficult moments in which we will be tempted to give up, but Christ comes to teach us how to fight against the temptations of the devil. In this important journey the Church invites us to open our heart towards the healing and purifying power of God.

Let us allow this Lent to test our attitudes, our values and our life. Then if we need to improve or change something, turn to Christ to help by the victory he already won for us. During this Season of Lent the Church gives us some spiritual weapons to help us in our fight:

- \* **Almsgiving:** Giving of our time, possessions or money to others in need helps us to appreciate and be thankful for all we have and helps us to give ourselves to others. Project Compassion is also a very good help.

## 120 Year Celebration Story cont...



The lack of living space and of adequate nourishment was not conducive to good health. By the middle of their first year, Mother Clare had contracted sandy blight and had then developed typhoid fever. Fr Bourke wrote that::

*"...poor little Mother Clare of Victoria Park is dangerously ill. Typhoid. One of the Sisters from Subiaco is at Victoria Park nursing her. Dr O'Connor thinks she will get it hard to pull through especially as she is so frail a little creature. There is also the fearful dread that, cooped up as the Sisters are, living in a heap together for want of space, the infection may run through the whole community."*

However, the next day he could write that the news about 'little Mother Clare' was not so bad today. Her face was a good deal drawn and pinched, nevertheless, Fr McLaughlin had presented him with the bill for the rent of the cottage. The Sisters could not meet it all. Should he pay it?

It would have been difficult for the Sisters to pay the rent on the proceeds of their school fees, five pence per week. Given the socio-economic status of the district, receipt of even those low fees would have been uncertain. As with all Convents of Mercy, the Sisters added to their small income by teaching music after school hours. Music teaching, in fact, became the main source of revenue. A number of benefactors also came to their aid. Mrs Chamberlain of the Railway Coffee Palace, opposite Perth Station, sent a large canvas bag full of many kinds of food each Saturday morning faithfully.

By 13 June, Mother Clare was going on favourably. She was extremely weak and looked very ill indeed. The Doctor thought she would pull through.

## Health Care Card Tuition & Building Levy Discount Scheme

Eligible cards for the Health Care Card (HCC) Tuition Fee Discount Scheme provide an automatic discount on the Tuition Fees and Building Levy to holders of a means tested family Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card. Further information can be obtained from the Catholic Education website: [www.cewa.edu.au](http://www.cewa.edu.au) or calling 6380 5200. Discounted tuition fee for 2019 is:

- \* \$300 pa for Primary students (Kindy-Year 6)
- \* \$1500 pa for Secondary students (Years 7-12)

The State Government Educational Program Allowance (EPA, currently \$235), which is part of the Secondary Assistance Scheme, is paid to schools. In effect the fee for eligible Secondary students (Years 7-12) will be \$1,735, less the \$235 EPA, leaving eligible parents to pay \$1,500. The discounted tuition fee does not cover additional charges such as camps, Resources levies and subject levies. For holders of other types of Pensioner Concession Cards, including students, the College's 15% discount on tuition fees still applies as per previous years.

To access the Health Care Card Tuition Fee Discount Scheme, Secondary Assistance Scheme or the College's 15% discount for other Pensioner Concession Card holders, parents/guardians will need to show a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card and complete forms at either campus. Secondary Assistance Scheme forms are available at the Duncan Street Campus only.

**Concession Card discounts are not on going and need to be applied for each year. Cards that expire mid-year also need to be updated or the discount will only apply until the expiry date on the card. The cut off date to apply is Friday 12 April 2019.**



## For parents/guardians of students:

### 2019 Student Residential Address and Other Information collection notice

This notice is from the Australian Government Department of Education and Training (the department), to advise you that the department has requested that your child's school provide a statement of addresses, in accordance with the Australian Education Regulation 2013 (Cth) (Regulation).

A *statement of addresses* contains the following information about each student at the school:

- Student residential address (**not student names**)
- Student level of education (i.e. whether the student is a primary or secondary student)
- Student boarding school status (i.e. whether the student is boarding or a day student)
- Names and residential addresses of students' parent(s) and/or guardian(s)

Schools generate a record number for each student for the purposes of this collection, which is also provided to the department.

#### Purpose of the collection

This collection is routinely used to inform Commonwealth school education policy, and to help ensure that Commonwealth funding arrangements for non-government schools are based on need, and are fair and transparent.

On 20 September 2018 the Government announced that it will implement a new, improved capacity to contribute methodology used in the calculation of the Commonwealth's needs-based funding arrangements for non-government schools. This follows a review of the existing socio-economic status (SES) score methodology by the National School Resourcing Board. Further information about the review and the Government's response can be found here: <https://www.education.gov.au/review-socio-economic-status-ses-score-methodology>.

The information collected in the *statement of addresses* will be used to refine the new capacity to contribute methodology and may also be used in school funding calculations from 2020.

#### Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law, including the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth). Any use and disclosure of your personal information relating to the *statement of addresses* will occur in accordance with the Regulation.

Your personal information may be used by the department, or disclosed to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), for the purposes of SES score policy development, reviewing SES score methodology, calculating SES scores, Commonwealth school education policy development (including school funding), or where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

For example, your personal information may be provided to the ABS for statistical and research purposes, which includes data integration projects such as the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Further information on the MADIP can be found here:

The department may, from time to time, carry out audits of school submissions. In the event of an audit, contracted auditors may seek to compare a school's *statement of addresses* with student enrolment information held by the school. These contractors will not use the information for any other purpose.

The department may also be required to disclose your personal information to its service providers, including the Australian Government Department of Jobs and Small Business, for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology (ICT) support services to the department.

You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested details to the department, however, you may wish to ensure that your school has the most up-to-date and correct details for your family.
