From the Principal

Dear Parents, Students and Friends of Ursula Frayne Catholic College,

GOOD MANNERS

Former Hollywood star, Fred Astaire was a gentleman in every sense of the word. In a nutshell, Astaire was one of the biggest stars of his day. He was one of the greatest dancers of all time in film and on Broadway stages, and was also famous as an actor and singer. Yes, he lived in a different era, but he had some important things to say about manners and personal conduct. He once stated, *"Disrespect towards others is the number one sign of bad manners no matter what your age is."*

Fred Astaire was also well known for some of his other traits. He was always well dressed, immaculately groomed, and was ever a gentleman. And, important for us here, he felt strongly about the importance of good manners.

Manners are something used every day to make a good impression on others and to feel good about oneself. No matter where we are - at home, work, or with friends - practicing good manners is important.

Good manners are more than opening doors and writing thank you notes. While opening doors for others and writing notes is nice, true courtesy goes deeper. Being polite and courteous means considering how others are feeling. In practicing good manners, we show those around us that we are considerate of their feelings and respectful.

ans are doing a great job of teaching young people the importance of good manners – not only in areas of communication, but in other areas as well. And it is of utmost importance for our young people to not only understand the concept of good manners but to also put them into practice.

At Frayne, we regularly remind, instruct and encourage students to choose their words and actions carefully and not to rush to comment about things they don't know much about or do things that may offend or cause embarrassment to others. As such, I take this opportunity to remind our young about the four most important 'respect words' that when used appropriately are reflective of good manners and therefore consideration of others. The words are: 'hello', 'please', 'thank you' and 'sorry'.

Most students are exemplary in their frequent and consistent use of these important words and accompanying actions. However, from time to time some do require prompting. As such, I encourage our young people, with your support, to write those four 'respect words' down, display them in a place and remind themselves everyday about their importance so that they take them to heart and use them frequently without the need for reminders.

As such, I pose a few important questions for all adult members of our *learning and faith sharing community, centred in Christ* to consider with our young people:

- Does it really matter if they remember to always say "hello", "please", "thank you" and "sorry"?
- Will saying "hello", "please", "thank you" and "sorry" actually help them in getting what they may need or want?
- Do they think that saying "hello", "please", "thank you" and "sorry" may be one of the marks of having good manners?
- Is it possible that saying "hello", "please", "thank you" and "sorry" can actually help their peers as well as themselves?

The unequivocal answer to all the above questions is YES. Using these small but important words can be beneficial to them in countless ways. Even if others around them do not use these terms, we can assure them that almost everyone around – adults and peers alike – will notice and admire them for their use of these simple words.

St Paul also has some marvelous words to offer us when he writes about respect and care, an all-embracing principle for life:


"... If I have no love, I am nothing... Love is patient and kind, it is not jealous or conceited or proud; love is not ill-mannered or selfish or irritable; love does not keep a record of wrongs; love is not happy with evil but is happy with the truth. Love never gives up. Love is eternal."
(1 Cor 13. 2-8)

In paraphrase it could be saying, *"Always be respectful and express yourself in a polite and courteous manner"*. Showing good manners in speech reveals that we have respect for others as well as for ourselves. Great news to share with our young people and I'm sure that Fred Astaire would also be most impressed!

Chaplain's Reflection

Light of Faith

'You can't judge a book by its cover'. We used this sentence when we realise we cannot make a fully informative decision by only looking at the outside of something. Yet many times we do. Our human judgment is easily affected by appearances. For this, we dedicate so much time on the arrangement of presentations, work and dishes of food, as if we could eat with our eyes. That's good, but the problem comes when we judge people only by appearances without discovering who they are inside. God does not look as we do; God looks at the heart and not at appearances. We are children of God and are called to see as God sees.

However to be able to see, there is not enough to have eyes. If you are in a dark room, you cannot see. The eyes need light to see. In the Gospel the blind man had eyes but cannot see. (Jn 9:1-41). This man was born blind, he only knew darkness. Apparently, he did not complain or cry out for healing, he was just there begging for alms at the door, when Christ put a paste on his eyes and ask him to go and wash. Christ not only opens his eyes but gives him the light of faith, since after he is cured Christ asks him: 'Do you believe in the Son of God?' And the man responds: 'Lord, I believe'.

This can happen to us. We can get used to looking at others' appearances and not realising how blind we are too many other things. Until something happens in our life and we comprehend, we need Christ to open our eyes and give us the light to faith. Faith will illuminate all that is dark in our life, give us a new vision and make us children of the light.
