From the Principal

Dear Parents, Students and Friends of Ursula Frayne Catholic College,

A STEP ALONG THE WAY

"Are we there yet?" are perhaps the four words parents/caregivers most dread hearing when in a car with children. I am sure that all parents have their standard response... "Soon", "Not much further", "We're five minutes closer than when you last asked" - and all parents experience the joy of that time when it finally arrives, of saying "yes, we are here".

The College is currently gearing up for the Quality Catholic Education School Review (QCESR). This very important and helpful process focuses on the effectiveness of the College's engagement with self-review, the impact of self-review on school improvement and the future directions for the improvement of student outcomes that are identified. As such, the QCESR fundamentally articulates strengths and future focus opportunities for our College. The process is guided by the QCE Elements - Catholic Identity, Education, Community and Stewardship and its associated frameworks, CECWA's Strategic Directions, together with the triangulation of various data sets and will be supported by the College's chosen improvement and selfreview tool.

The preparation of the College's Self-Review Statement for the visiting panel has afforded an opportunity to look back over the past three-four years and to reflect on how far the College has come during that time, despite the intervening challenges of the pandemic. But, unlike car travel with children, Frayne will never be able to answer the question "are we there yet?" with the joyous "yes" – because the reality is that there will always be more for us to do. We are constantly moving in the direction of the light at the end of the tunnel, and we can see our tracks behind us – verifying that we have moved, but the light always seems that same distance away.

The sense of never being at the end can evoke different emotional responses, negative and positive. There are those times when it seems overwhelming and the desire to retreat and/or give-in is almost too strong to ignore. There are other times when the same sense of incompleteness is invigorating and exhilarating, spurring us on to even greater goals. The emotions of despair and exhilaration are natural and normal, but, both the positive and negative emotions can be problematic if they become all-consuming or over-powering.

As our *learning and faith sharing community, centred in Christ* continues to grow and develop through a process of evolution (as opposed to revolution), and as we grapple with the knowledge that our work will always be incomplete, there is much comfort and beauty in the powerful words of the prayer 'A Step Along the Way', often referred to as the 'Prayer of Oscar Romero':

A Step Along the Way

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view.

The kingdom is only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work.

Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said.

No prayer fully expresses our faith.

No confession brings perfection.

No pastoral visit brings wholeness.

No program accomplishes the Church's mission.

No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about.

We plant the seeds that one day will grow.

We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise.

We lay foundations that will need further development.

We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realising that.

This enables us to do something and do it very well.

It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way,

an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end result,

but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker.

We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs.

We are prophets of a future not our own.



So, there is comfort in a project that can never be completed in this world. And there is also reassurance and cause for celebration in the individual steps along the way; Frayne Graduates completing their studies; staff completing projects and delivering lessons; the development and implementation of new initiatives together with the construction of new structures and the refurbishment of existing facilities. Above all, we see around us lives touched and futures transformed. And for this we give thanks to God.

College Advisory Council Notes

The College Advisory Council met on Tuesday 18 July 2023 with the College's leadership team to discuss the status and considerable progress against the UFCC Strategic Directions 2021-2023, which are mapped against the CEWA Quality Catholic Schools' framework components of Catholic Identity, Education, Community and Stewardship. It was noted that there are some significant contextual issues, including the unforeseen challenges associated with COVID-19, which mean that it is sensible to extend the current Strategic Directions to the end of 2024. This will have the added benefit of allowing consideration of the outcomes of the College's participation in the forthcoming Quality Catholic Education School Review to inform any new directions, along with the participation of the new Principal, Mr Mark Antulov.

In addition, as part of his report to the Council, the Principal, Mr Geoff Mills, discussed planning around work health and safety at the College following recent changes to legislative requirements.

The Council also continued its consideration of the College's financial position and the status of capital development planning with respect to Stages 13A and 13B.

Chaplain's Reflection

SAINTS JOACHIM AND ANNE

Pope Francis established the World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly as a reminder of the important role they play as a link between generations. This day is celebrated every year on the Sunday closest to the Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, the parents of Mary and the grandparents of Jesus, 26 July. The theme chosen by the Pope this year is "His mercy is from age to age" (Lk 1:50). This theme is linked to the theme for World Youth Day 2023, which also comes from the first chapter of the Gospel of Luke: "Mary arose and went with haste" (Lk 1:39). Saints Joachim and Anne are the patrons of Parents and Grandparents, interceding to help them in the important mission to pass on the faith to their children. Parents need to teach their children to pray and to know the love of God and grandparents should give their collective human and spiritual wisdom to offer assistance in the faith development.

This feast is also the Patronal Feast of the Parish of Victoria Park name after St Joachim. Its name was proposed by Pope Leo XIII when the Bishop of Perth, Matthew Gibney, went to visit him in Rome in 1898. Bishop Gibney told the Pope of a his plans to establish a new Parish and Church neighbouring the Cathedral Parish and the Pope suggested to name it after his own baptismal name of Joachim.



St Joachim is a great Saint for another great Cluster of our College; let us pray that through the intercession of Our Blessed Mother and her Parents, Saints Joachim and Anne, we may obtain the grace to treasure the spiritual and human wealth of our Grandparents and the Elderly.

Vinnies 'Tough Night Out' is Back for 2023

On Friday 15 September (Term 3, Week 9), staff and students will be sleeping tough to support homeless youth in our community.

Being involved in the Tough Night Out means:

- actively fundraising by sharing an online donation link with friends and family
- sleeping 'tough' for a night, without luxuries or technology, to reflect and gain experience
 of what it's like to be homeless

How does the fundraising help homeless youth?

The funds raised from the event go to Passages Youth Engagement Hubs. Passages supports homeless and at risk youth, some as young as 12 years old. The money is used to provide homeless youth with food, shelter, clothing, counselling, job training, and other support services. Last year, Ursula Frayne raised over \$13,000!

What happens at the Tough Night Out?

The Tough Night Out is a safe and social Christian Service Learning event where students will:

- enjoy time with friends
- learn and reflect about the challenges faced by homeless youth
- gain a new appreciation for their lives and families

A few points to consider...

Students have until the end of Week 3 to register interest in this event via the link on the SEQTA Notices page.

Students get very little rest at the Tough Night Out, so it's recommended that they do not have commitments on the Saturday morning following if they wish to be involved.

During Week 4, students who registered their interest will be asked if they would prefer to complete the Tough Night Out at home with a small group, or at school with the larger group. Numbers allowed for the school sleepover will be decided upon in Week 4 and further information will be released then.

them in harmonising these colours to bring emotion into their paintings.


