## Vice Principal's Report

First, we had the Interhouse athletics carnival and I acknowledge the massive job Friend of Frayne did feeding everyone, it was much appreciated.

Families with students in Year 10, there have been a few changes with our pathway into year 11/12 for next year, trying to align them a bit more. We are working out what the students post school goals are and what it will looks like, ATAR, flexi pathway, skill based pathway. Michael Openshaw began last year, this is his area of specialty. This is trying to get clearer direction for our students. We fully acknowledge that for a lot of students many don't know what they want to do, but they may have some idea of where they want to go, fully knowing that they are 16 and changes will happen and we will accommodate them to a certain level but there needs to be some restrictions in place, this also includes special ed and neuro diverse students. We held a parent night where there was a video made by students from a student's perspective, it received good feedback. It's all about maximum options for the kids.

Staff finished the term on a spirituality day at Fremantle, organized by Sarah. Great opportunity to hear guest speakers and do different activities, then we all came together sharing lunch, it was all around how Mass works for us.

Holiday works on both campuses have been massive. Balmoral has the new playground; poles have gone up for the shade sails (as we have had the sign off from council) in the early learning center.

Massive work on Duncan campus as well, we have redesigned student services to have a pastoral care center, all the heads of year are next to student services, there is now a health care center with a school

nurse, we are putting all the services together. Next is refurbishment of the café so it will be more of a café rather than a flow through. We have a chef doing consulting on that.

Library is the other big project, IT is moving in, this brings the library and IT services together. Leanne Appleford has done a massive job organizing trades and clearing offices etc. lots of positive feedback from students.

There is a new structure for Jo and Pauline's leadership roles, they will no longer be heads of school, Pauline is now Deputy of Pastoral care 7-12 and Jo is deputy of curriculum 7-12.

## MATTERS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

## MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

1. Fathering project – Rebecca McAdam

The Fathering Project is a Nationwide program designed to get fathers tools and resources for Dads to run social groups out of schools. Schools can run it, but most commonly it's run through P&C's. It started in WA by Professor Bruce Robinson who is a doctor that deals with cancer treatments, during treatment something that was repeatedly heard was dads regretted not being better fathers. He then developed this program.

Once a term The Fathering project have a dad and kids' event, mini golf, bike rides, school sleep overs, camp etc. It's a lovely program. Is this something Friends of Frayne would be interested in?

This would be more of a coordinating project. It could become a subcommittee of Friends of Frayne. Fathering project will come and help launch. Cost, there's different levels (3) essentials - \$500 (all online), Event kit/tools guide \$1000, then Empower which is almost \$4k which has more resources and a forum fathering fundamentals workshop.

We will have to work out how it would all work, do we have a coordinator at each campus? Maybe have a subcommittee, maybe start at the primary school? Friends of Frayne will put out an expression of interest. Everyone in favour to proceed? Yes.

## 2. Small Grants

1<sup>st</sup> Sunscreen – Nicole and the Sun Safety Committee

The sun cream Kiosk has some questions around viability and covering cost of refill. Firstly, my backstory, 3 years ago I was diagnosed stage 4 Melanoma, now in the clear. Skin cancer is very prevalent in Australia and prevention reduces melanoma down to 40%. We need to wear sunscreen with an UV index of 3, in Perth that's basically all the time. As parents this means protecting our children. The high school is terrible in regard to sun safety, the primary school is not so bad.

The Sun Committee engaged the cancer council to become a sun smart school this looks at the uniform policy, time events are held, how we deal with sun protection. Shade is important and more shade sails are coming soon. We have a UV meter which is on loan from cancer council. Sunscreen came up, it does dispense sun cream, but the kiosk is more about awareness than putting on sunscreen, it's a reminder for them to reapply. Unit is pretty sturdy; it does require topping up. It's about keeping up the conversation and attention and a reminder for sun protection.

Questions raised

- Could we put it on Duncan Street? Response - So many capital changes, too many things happening at Duncan Campus currently.

- Does it just become a mess? response not new idea, plenty of schools have this and would have dealt with this issue.
- Refills were quite expensive for not a lot of sun cream who would pay for refill? No clarity on it at the moment
- Where would it be stored? Suncream is temperature dependent (store below 30 degrees)
  would be kept in the shade

No resolution for this tonight, maybe look at other options, the unit cost \$1800-1900, are we spending money where its not really needed? There is a lack of shade at Duncan Campus, maybe spend money on that instead. Staff have had education with cancer council now they will be coming into the classrooms speaking to kids. Decided to look at different options, maybe hire a Kiosk, look at cheaper units etc.

2<sup>nd</sup> Write a Book in a Day

9th August is Write a Book in a Day, 75 students have signed up and put into teams, we have been asked to cover registration and food costs (Pizza for dinner and snacks) totaling \$1416. This gets a big take up from the students, the books are put out to various organisations to access, there is also fund raising. Its writing, its illustration, it taps into a group of students that have access to show their skills. Wonderful to see the type of students that get involved. It's a kids cancer project. The college funded it last year, but there was a lack of understanding on how to apply for the grant, so it came out of the English budget and sub school budget. Finishes at 8/8.30 – it has got a way of bringing out the students, and they don't have to be an A grade student.
